



CHANGES TO AJADS

Next year, to accommodate the higher number of AJADs, U21s will be counted as seniors/adults and not eligible for AJAD medals. It was agreed at the club general meeting that U21s can still shoot at the AJADs if there are spaces. The U18s have first preference, then their parents (as this is a family activity), and third, U21s. However, they will not be eligible to win the "AJAD tournament".

The Errol Scott Award for Excellence has been decided by all the coaches, with only one voting form still outstanding. However, this will not affect the outcome.

Next year, the coaches have decided to eliminate the "Annual Wand" competition, as it will be included in the "Wand and Windage" event.





PROGRESS ON THE CLUB ROOMS EXTENSION

FROM THE TREASURER, KYLIE STEYN

Significant invoices have started to arrive (\$73k) which depletes our assets. They will continue at a rapid pace until project completion around Dec/Jan. Remaining cost to completion is about \$300k, which, once paid, will leave us with approximately \$50k in the bank.

New roof is installed.

Windows on southern side have been installed.

Wooden cladding is about to be installed.

Stormwater pipe has been installed adjacent to the concrete of the

Electrical power will be out for all of Monday 18 November to permit the new meter to be connected.

Project completion is planned for the end of December, 2024.
